I am writing this letter to oppose TVA's request to the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) to loosen the rules regarding the water permit at the Kingston Coal plant. In 2015, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) of the Federal Government required a permit to limit toxic water pollution from coal fired plants. At that point, the EPA gave companies (including TVA) until 2023 to install new wastewater treatment technologies to significantly decrease the metals (specifically mercury, arsenic and selenium) in the water that is released into the Clinch and Emory Rivers. I realize that in 2020 the EPA rules were loosened; TVA wants to take advantage of those loosened rules in its hearing on November 22, 2021. I appeal to you to deny that request. Any toxic pollution dumped into our rivers and streams affects the fish, plants, wildlife and eventually the human population that will drink that water.

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




